As a Development Coordinator, Elizabeth manages CoEd's annual Fall Fiesta and other special events. She also works on the major gifts and marketing teams and provides board support.

Cooperative for Education (CoEd) provides a low-cost, sustainable solution for giving students access to textbooks. Every program participant "rents" a set of books in core subjects like math, science, Spanish language, and social studies for a small monthly fee (about \$1.50). These fees are collected into a revolving fund which is used to replace the books as they wear out. Books are purchased in bulk directly from a large Guatemalan publisher, thus securing the lowest possible price and contributing to the local economy.

Textbooks Make the Difference

The Textbook Program has a 20-year successful track record of increasing the amount of material covered in classes, improving the learning experience, and reducing dropout rates by an average of 16%. Studies show that, simply by staying in school, young people in Guatemala can improve their earning potential by as much as 182%. With higher wages, they can escape the hardship that has plagued their families for generations—breaking the cycle of poverty once and for all. A recent independent study of the Textbook Program also showed that Textbook Program students score higher on standardized math and reading tests than students at comparison schools.
