Get to Know David Baranowski

David Baranowski was born at the old LDS Hospital in Salt Lake City and raised on the nice side of 1900 East in Salt Lake City. He attended Dilworth Elementary, Clayton Junior High and Highland High School. He graduated in 1977.



David served an LDS mission to Norway. He had no idea where it was at the time. No thanks to social studies at Highland High. He spent most of his two years in the North. He arrived in Tromsø on the first day of

The holiday party reception and dinner will be held in the Emma Eccles Jones Conservatory on the Westminster campus, Building 18 on the far right of the attached map. Rotarians should park in the North Parking Structure, indicated with a B in a blue circle, in the upper right corner of the map. Enter the garage directly from 1700 South (at approximately 1250 East). If you park on that level, go into the doors that are to your left as soon as you pull into the garage. Once inside, go up one level by way of the elevator or the



broad staircase at the end of that hallway. At the top of the stairs you'll be able to see the party in the Richer Alcove/Tanner Atrium.

If the weather is good or parking on that level is full, you may prefer to drive up the ramp to the roof level of the parking garage. At this level, you can just go through the doors at the NE corner of the parking area, and proceed straight down the hall-way to where the party is being held in the Richer Alcove/Tanner Atrium.
